

## Austrian-Hungarian POWs in Russia <u>Committee of the International Red Cross</u> POW Correspondence Cards




Map showing the Austrian-Hungarian Empire pitted against Imperial Russia at the beginning of WWI

An estimated 2,100,000 Austro-Hungarian soldiers were captured (over 20% of their army) mainly because they were greatly outnumbered by the better equipped Russian forces on the eastern front.




Due to the poor Russian postal organization, POW mail in the beginning of the war was written on anything that was handy and would fit in an envelope (i.e. letters, cards and / or paper torn out of magazines or books). In 1915, the overwhelmed Russian post office began producing postcards for the POWs. In order to make the censors' job easier, it was provided that messages shall be written only in the Russian, French, or German languages.
